

## Apple Cider Pillow Beige colourway

Six plump apples decorate this delightful pillow and the generous size of the pillow makes it perfect to snuggle up to in winter, or any time of year. The sewing is easy and the result will make the perfect companion to the Apple Cider Quilt. This pillow has a beige Chambray background and there is another version with a pine-coloured background. For the alternate colour pillow, see page 8 .

- Fabric 1: $1 / 2 \mathrm{yd}(50 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Chambray beige (160036) (background)
- Fabric 2: one square $2 \frac{1}{4}$ in ( 5.7 cm ) - Chambray sage (160011)
- Fabric 3: one square $21 / 4 \mathrm{in}(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Chambray pine (160033)
- Fabric 4: six pieces $3 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 11 / 2$ in ( $2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 3.8 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) - Chambray brown (160035)
- Fabric 5: one piece $43 / 41 \mathrm{in} \times 41 / 2 \mathrm{in}(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Avery red (130144)
- Fabric 6: one square $2 \frac{1}{4}$ in ( 5.7 cm ) - Evie green (130145)
- Fabric 7: one piece $43 / 4$ in x $41 / 2$ in ( $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) - Berrytangle burgundy (130147)
- Fabric 8: one square $21 / 4 \mathrm{in}$ ( 5.7 cm ) - Lulu sand (130148)
- Fabric 9: one piece $43 / 4$ in x $41 / 2$ in ( $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) - Frida red (130150)
- Fabric 10: one square $2 \frac{1}{4}$ in ( 5.7 cm ) - Gracie green (130151)
- Fabric 11: one piece $43 / 4$ in x $41 / 2$ in $(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Tiny Dot red (160081)
- Fabric 12: one square $21 / 4$ in $(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Stripe green (160082)
- Fabric 13: one piece $43 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 41 / 2 \mathrm{in}(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Tiny Stripe red (160084)
- Fabric 14: one piece $43 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 41 / 2 \mathrm{in}(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Polka Dot red (160085)
- Wadding (batting): $23 \mathrm{in} \times 20 \mathrm{in}$ ( $58.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 51 \mathrm{~cm}$ )
- Lining fabric: 23 in $\times 20$ in ( $58.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 51 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) (optional)
- Fabric for back of pillow: $5 / 8 \mathrm{syd}(60 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Brie red (130149)
- Binding fabric: $1 / 4 y d(25 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Brie red (130149)
- Piecing and quilting threads
- Quilter's ruler, rotary cutter and mat
- Pack of Creating Memories Buttons in Christmas Reds and Greens 10 mm and 12 mm (400065)
- Pillow pad to fit cover


## Finished Size

$211 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 18 \mathrm{in}$ ( $54 \mathrm{~cm} \times 45.7 \mathrm{~cm}$ )

## Fabric Notes

The Chambray fabric can be cut in any direction for the most economical use of the fabric. The fabrics used for the apples and the leaves only need a single piece of fabric so the exact size is given in the Materials list.

## General Notes

- Fabric quantities are based on a usable width of $42 \mathrm{in}(107 \mathrm{~cm})$, unless otherwise stated.
- Measurements are in imperial inches with metric conversions in brackets - use only one system throughout (preferably inches). Width measurements are generally given first.
- Press fabric before cutting and trim as needed to square up the fabric pattern/weave, using a quilting ruler to cut the top raw edge at 90 degrees to the selvedges.
- Use $1 / 4 \mathrm{in}(6 \mathrm{~mm})$ seams unless otherwise instructed.
- Read all the instructions through before you start.
- Always make one complete block as a test before going on to make the remaining blocks.


## Pillow Layout

1 The pillow is made up of six Apple blocks, with vertical sashing pieces between the blocks and horizontal sashing in the centre and at the top and bottom of the pillow. See Fig A for the fabrics used and Fig B for the pillow layout and the fabric positions.

## Cutting Out

2 From Fabric 1 cut the sashing pieces first as shown in Fig C.

- Sashing A - cut eight strips $21 / 2$ in $\times 61 / 4 i n(6.4 \mathrm{~cm} \times 16 \mathrm{~cm})$.
- Sashing B - cut three strips $211 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 21 / 2 \mathrm{in}(54 \mathrm{~cm} \times 6.4 \mathrm{~cm})$.

## Sashing A - cut 8

$21 / 2$ in $\times 61 / 4$ in ( $6.4 \mathrm{~cm} \times 16 \mathrm{~cm}$ )

Sashing B-cut 3
$211 / 4$ in $\times 21 / 2$ in $(54 \mathrm{~cm} \times 6.4 \mathrm{~cm})$

3 To cut the Fabric 1 pieces for the blocks follow the measurements in Fig D (pieces a, b, d, f and $\mathbf{h}$ ). For the rest of the fabrics, the Materials list give the exact sizes to cut.

4 Cut the fabric for the back of the pillow into two pieces each about 22in x $10 \mathrm{in}(56 \mathrm{~cm} \mathrm{x}$ 25.5 cm ).

5 Cut the binding fabric into three $21 / 2$ in $(6.4 \mathrm{~cm}) \mathrm{x}$ width of fabric strips. Sew the strips together end to end and press seams open. Press the binding in half along the length, wrong sides together.

h $13 / 4$ in $(4.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ square

## Making the Blocks

6 The blocks are all made the same way and the main technique used is creating corner triangle units. Fig E shows the process, as follows. Place the larger piece of fabric right side up (RS). Take the smaller square and pencil mark a diagonal line on the wrong side (WS). Pin the square right sides together with the larger fabric piece, aligning the edges as shown and with the diagonal line in the direction needed. Sew along the marked line. Trim off excess fabric $1 / 4 i n(6 \mathrm{~mm})$ outside the sewn line and press the triangle outwards. Check the unit is the same size as the original larger piece of fabric, with no distortion.
All corner triangle units are made this way - the green dotted box in Fig E shows the two units for Block 1.

7 When the corner triangle units have been made for a block, the block can be assembled.
Follow Fig F for the stages, pressing seams after each stage and pressing them open or to one side. When the block is sewn check it is $43 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 61 / 4 \mathrm{in}(12 \mathrm{~cm} \mathrm{x} 16 \mathrm{~cm}$ ).

8 Use the same block-making process to make the other blocks, making one of each and following Fig B for the fabric positions.

## Assembling the Pillow

9 To complete the patchwork, sew the blocks together into two rows with Sashing A pieces in between, as in Fig G, pressing seams towards the sashing. Now sew the rows together with the Sashing B strips between the rows and at the top and bottom of the pillow. Press seams towards the sashing.

## Quilting and Finishing

10 Make a quilt sandwich of the patchwork, wadding (batting) and lining fabric (if using). Quilt as desired. Trim off excess wadding and lining fabric to match the patchwork size.

11 To make up the pillow cover, take the two pieces of fabric for the cushion back and on one long edge of each piece, create a hem by turning the edge over by $1 \mathrm{in}(2.5 \mathrm{~cm})$, twice. Sew the seams with matching thread and press ( $\mathbf{F i g} \mathbf{H}$ ). The diagram is shown in greys, so you can use the Tilda fabric and buttons suggested in the Materials list, or those of your choice.

12 For the fastening, using your sewing machine, create five equally spaced buttonholes within the hem of one of the pieces. Sew five buttons onto the other piece, matching their positions to the buttonholes. Note: Instead of making buttonholes, you could use a hook and loop fastening, such as Velcro, to fasten the cover and sew on the buttons as a decorative feature.

13 The pillow has a bound edge, so the pieces are assembled with right sides out, as follows. On the backing, fasten the buttons into the buttonholes and place the whole piece right side down. Place the quilted patchwork on top, right side up. Make sure the outer edges of all pieces are aligned, trimming the back piece if needed. Pin or tack (baste) the layers together and then bind as normal. As you sew the binding in place it will fix the other layers together. Press the cover and insert a pillow pad to finish.

## Apple Cider Pillow Pine colourway

The sewing is easy and if you have made the Apple Cider Quilt you should have some scraps left over to make this pillow. - Fabric 1: $1 / 2 y d(50 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Chambray pine (160033) (background)
- Fabric 2: one square $2 \frac{1}{4} / \mathrm{in}(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Chambray sage (160011)
- Fabric 3: one square $2 \frac{1}{4}$ in $(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Chambray olive (160012)
- Fabric 4: six pieces $3 / 4$ in x $1 \frac{1}{2}$ in ( $2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 3.8 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) - Chambray beige (160036)
- Fabric 5: one square $2 \frac{1}{4}$ in $(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Evie green (130145)
- Fabric 6: one piece $4 \frac{3}{4}$ in $\times 41 / 2$ in ( $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) - Harper pink (130146)
- Fabric 7: one square $21 / 4 \mathrm{in}(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Lulu sand (130148)
- Fabric 8: one piece $43 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 41 / 2 \mathrm{in}(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Brie red (130149)
- Fabric 9: one square $21 / 4 \mathrm{in}(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Gracie green (130151)
- Fabric 10: one piece $43 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 41 / 2 \mathrm{in}(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Carla red (130152)
- Fabric 11: one square $21 / 4$ in $(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Stripe green (160082)
- Fabric 12: one piece $43 / 4$ in $\times 41 / 2$ in $(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Seamstripe red (160083)
- Fabric 13: one piece $43 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 41 / 2$ in ( $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) - Plaid burgundy ( 160086 )
- Fabric 14: one piece $43 / 4$ in $\times 41 / 2 \operatorname{in}(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Gingham red (160087)
- Wadding (batting): $23 \mathrm{in} \times 20 \mathrm{in}$ ( $58.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 51 \mathrm{~cm}$ )
- Lining fabric: 23 in $\times 20$ in ( $58.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 51 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) (optional)
- Fabric for back of pillow: $5 / 8 \mathrm{yd}(60 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Polka Dot red (160085)
- Binding fabric: $1 / 4 y d(25 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Polka Dot red (160085)

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## Pillow Layout

1 The pillow is made up of six Apple blocks, with vertical sashing pieces between the blocks and horizontal sashing in the centre and at the top and bottom of the pillow. See Fig A for the fabrics used and Fig B for the pillow layout and the fabric positions.

## Cutting Out

2 From Fabric 1 cut the sashing pieces first as shown in Fig C.

- Sashing A - cut eight strips $2 \frac{1}{2}$ in $\times 61 / 41 / 2(6.4 \mathrm{~cm} \times 16 \mathrm{~cm})$.
- Sashing B - cut three strips $211 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 21 / 2 \mathrm{in}(54 \mathrm{~cm} \times 6.4 \mathrm{~cm})$.

## Sashing A - cut 8

2½in $\times 61 / 4$ in $(6.4 \mathrm{~cm} \times 16 \mathrm{~cm})$

Sashing B-cut 3
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4 Cut the fabric for the back of the pillow into two pieces each about 22in x $10 \mathrm{in}(56 \mathrm{~cm} \mathrm{x}$ 25.5 cm ).

5 Cut the binding fabric into three $2 \frac{1}{2}$ in $(6.4 \mathrm{~cm}) \mathrm{x}$ width of fabric strips. Sew the strips together end to end and press seams open. Press the binding in half along the length, wrong sides together.

c $3 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 11 / 2 \mathrm{in}(2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 3.8 \mathrm{~cm})$
d $3 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 11 / 2 \mathrm{in}(2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 3.8 \mathrm{~cm})$
e $21 / 4 \mathrm{in}(5.7 \mathrm{~cm})$ square
f $1 \frac{1}{4}$ in $(3.2 \mathrm{~cm})$ square
g $43 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 41 / 2$ in $(12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11.4 \mathrm{~cm})$
h $13 / 4$ in $(4.4 \mathrm{~cm})$ square

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All corner triangle units are made this way - the green dotted box in Fig E shows the two units for Block 1.

7 When the corner triangle units have been made for a block, the block can be assembled. Follow Fig $\mathbf{F}$ for the stages, pressing seams after each stage and pressing them open or to one side. When the block is sewn check it is $43 / 4$ in $\times 61 / 4$ in $(12 \mathrm{~cm} \mathrm{x} 16 \mathrm{~cm})$.

8 Use the same block-making process to make the other blocks, making one of each and following Fig B for the fabric positions.

## Assembling the Pillow

9 To complete the patchwork, sew the blocks together into two rows with Sashing A pieces in between, as in Fig G, pressing seams towards the sashing. Now sew the rows together with the Sashing B strips between the rows and at the top and bottom of the pillow. Press seams towards the sashing.

## Quilting and Finishing

10 Make a quilt sandwich of the patchwork, wadding (batting) and lining fabric (if using). Quilt as desired. Trim off excess wadding and lining fabric to match the patchwork size.

11 To make up the pillow cover, take the two pieces of fabric for the cushion back and on one long edge of each piece, create a hem by turning the edge over by 1 in ( 2.5 cm ), twice. Sew the seams with matching thread and press ( $\mathbf{F i g} \mathbf{H}$ ). The diagram is shown in greys, so you can use the Tilda fabric and buttons suggested in the Materials list, or those of your choice.

12 For the fastening, using your sewing machine, create five equally spaced buttonholes within the hem of one of the pieces. Sew five buttons onto the other piece, matching their positions to the buttonholes. Note: Instead of making buttonholes, you could use a hook and loop fastening, such as Velcro, to fasten the cover and sew on the buttons as a decorative feature.

13 The pillow has a bound edge, so the pieces are assembled with right sides out, as follows. On the backing, fasten the buttons into the buttonholes and place the whole piece right side down. Place the quilted patchwork on top, right side up. Make sure the outer edges of all pieces are aligned, trimming the back piece if needed.
