

## Potted Flowers Pillow

This charming pillow with its row of potted flowers looks so pretty made with the spring and Easter pastels from the Creating Memories fabric collection, although the design is so timeless it would suit any Tilda fabrics. The background for the flowers is a warm brown but you could easily use another Chambray colour. If you enjoy making these easy blocks, then the Potted Flowers Quilt would be the perfect next project - see tildasworld.com for the quilt instructions.

## Materials

- Fabric 1: $1 / 2 y d(50 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Chambray brown (160035) (background)
- Fabric 2: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Harper yellow (130122)
- Fabric 3: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Evie dove white (130125)
- Fabric 4: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Tiny Dot pink (160061)
- Fabric 5: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Tiny Stripe pink (160063)
- Fabric 6: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Polka Dot Yellow (160064)
- Fabric 7: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Plaid pea green (160066)
- Fabric 8: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Chambray sage (160011)
- Fabric 9: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Chambray olive (160012)
- Fabric 10: 9in (23cm) square - Chambray coral (160014)
- Fabric 11: 9in ( 23 cm ) square - Chambray warm yellow (160015)
- Wadding (batting): 31 in $\times 21$ in ( $79 \mathrm{~cm} \times 53 \mathrm{~cm}$ )
- Lining fabric: 31 in $\times 21$ in ( $79 \mathrm{~cm} \times 53 \mathrm{~cm}$ ) (optional)
- Fabric for back of cushion: $3 / 4 \mathrm{yd}(75 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Brie green (130121)
- Binding fabric: $1 / 4 \mathrm{yd}(25 \mathrm{~cm})$ - Carla pink (130118)
- Piecing and quilting threads
- Quilter's ruler, rotary cutter and mat
- Five buttons for back fastening (optional): Creating Memories Buttons, Spring and Easter Pastels 10 mm and 12 mm (400062)
- Pillow pad to fit cover


## Finished Size

$28^{1} / 2$ in $\times 183 / 4$ in ( $72.4 \mathrm{~cm} \times 47.6 \mathrm{~cm}$ )

## Fabric Notes

All of the fabrics, apart from the background, use less than a 9 in ( 23 cm ) square, so a fabric pack of $10 \mathrm{in}(25 \mathrm{~cm})$ squares would be ideal for this pillow.

## General Notes

- Fabric quantities are based on a usable width of 42 in $(107 \mathrm{~cm})$, unless otherwise stated.
- Measurements are in imperial inches with metric conversions in brackets - use only one system throughout (preferably inches). Width measurements are generally given first.
- Press fabric before cutting and trim as needed to square up the fabric pattern/weave, using a quilting ruler to cut the top raw edge at 90 degrees to the selvedges.
- Use $1 / 4 \mathrm{in}(6 \mathrm{~mm})$ seams unless otherwise instructed.
- Read all the instructions through before you start.
- Always make one complete block as a test before going on to make the remaining blocks.


## Pillow Layout

1 The pillow is made up of three potted flower blocks, separated by sashing strips and bordered by fabric strips at the sides, top and bottom. Refer to Fig A for the fabrics used and Fig B for the pillow layout, fabric positions and cut sizes of the sashing and borders.

## Cutting Out

2 From Fabric 1 cut the sashing and border pieces first, cutting the following pieces (see Fig B).

- Side Borders - two strips 3in x $133 / 4 \mathrm{in}$ ( $7.6 \mathrm{~cm} \times 35 \mathrm{~cm}$ ).
- Top and Bottom Borders - two strips $281 / 2 \mathrm{in} \times 3 \mathrm{in}$ ( $72.4 \mathrm{~cm} \times 7.6 \mathrm{~cm}$ ).
- Sashing - two strips 3 in $\times 133 / 4 \mathrm{in}$ ( $7.6 \mathrm{~cm} \times 35 \mathrm{~cm}$ ).

3 For the whole pillow cut the following pieces from Fabric 1 (see also Fig C, Fig D and Fig E).

- $11 / 4 \mathrm{in}(3.2 \mathrm{~cm})$ squares (b on Fig C) - cut 36 squares.
- 2 in $(5.1 \mathrm{~cm})$ squares (d on $\mathbf{F i g} \mathbf{D})$ - cut 12 squares.
- $11 / 2 \mathrm{in} \times 31 / 2 \mathrm{in}(3.8 \mathrm{~cm} \times 9 \mathrm{~cm})$ rectangles (f on Fig E) - cut 6 rectangles.
- $3 / 4 \mathrm{in} \times 31 / 2 \mathrm{in}(2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 9 \mathrm{~cm})$ rectangles ( $\mathbf{g}$ on Fig E) - cut 6 rectangles.

4 For the whole pillow (flower units) cut four $31 / 2$ in $(9 \mathrm{~cm})$ squares (a on Fig C) from each of Fabrics 2,3 and 6.

5 For the whole pillow (flower units) cut twelve 11/4in (3.2cm) squares (b on Fig C) from Fabric 10.
6 For the whole pillow (leaf units) cut two $31 / 2 \mathrm{in}(9 \mathrm{~cm})$ squares (c on Fig D) from each of Fabrics 7, 8 and 9.

7 For the whole pillow (flowerpot units) cut the following pieces.

- Three rectangles 6 in x $31 / 2$ in $(15.2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 9 \mathrm{~cm})(\mathbf{e}$ on Fig E) from each of Fabrics 4, 5 and 11.
- Three rectangles $61 / 2 \mathrm{in} \times 13 / 4 \mathrm{in}(16.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 4.4 \mathrm{~cm})(\mathbf{h}$ on Fig E) from each of Fabrics 4, 5 and 11.

8 Cut the fabric for the back of the pillow into two pieces, each about $30 \mathrm{in} \times 13 \mathrm{in}(76 \mathrm{~cm} \times 33 \mathrm{~cm})$.
9 Cut the binding fabric into three $2 \frac{1}{2}$ in $(6.4 \mathrm{~cm}) \mathrm{x}$ width of fabric strips. Sew the strips together end to end and press seams open. Press the binding in half along the length, wrong sides together.

## Making a Potted Flower Block

10 Block 1 (left side of pillow) is described and illustrated in detail. The majority of the piecing uses a corner triangle technique, described as follows.

11 Making the flower units: Fig F 1 shows the stages of creating corner triangles on a flower unit. Place the larger piece of fabric right side up (RS). Take the small squares and pencil mark a diagonal line on the wrong side of each square. Pin the squares right sides together with the larger fabric piece, aligning the edges as shown and with the diagonal lines in the direction indicated. Be
sure to place the coral square in the corner shown. Sew along the marked lines. Trim off excess fabric $1 / 4 \mathrm{in}(6 \mathrm{~mm})$ outside the sewn lines and press the triangles outwards. Make four units like this. Follow Fig F 2 to sew the four units together to make a flower unit, using a $1 / 4 \mathrm{in}$ ( 6 mm ) seam and arranging the coral triangles together in the centre. Make sure the seams are nicely aligned, especially at the centre. Check the sewn unit measures $61 / 2 i n(16.5 \mathrm{~cm})$ square.
All of the flower units are made this way, changing fabrics as needed (shown in Fig B).

12 Making the leaf units: Fig G 1 shows the process for creating the triangles on the leaf - you can see it's the same process as used for the flowers but using the sizes and fabrics needed for the leaves. When the individual units are made, follow Fig G 2 to sew the unit together, checking it is $61 / 2 \mathrm{in} \times 31 / 2 \mathrm{in}(16.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 9 \mathrm{~cm})$. All of the leaf units are made this way, changing fabrics as needed.

13 Making the flowerpot units: Fig H shows the process for creating the long triangles needed for the flowerpot. Begin by taking piece e, and on the right side (RS), use a removeable marker to mark the $1 / 4$ in ( 6 mm ) seam allowance or just dots at the corners (see Fig H 1). On the bottom edge mark dots on the seam allowance (shown in red), one $11 / 4 \mathrm{in}(3.2 \mathrm{~cm})$ in from the bottom right-hand edge and one $11 / 4 \mathrm{in}(3.2 \mathrm{~cm})$ in from the bottom left-hand edge, as shown.
Take the two background pieces $\mathbf{f}$ and on the wrong side (WS) mark the $1 / 4 \mathrm{in}(6 \mathrm{~mm})$ seam allowances - these can be pencil lines or just dots at the corners (see Fig H 1). Mark the diagonal lines, in the directions shown, making sure the lines go through the seam allowance dots (and not the outer corners of the fabric).

14 Take the background pieces and, with right sides together, angle them following Fig H 2, so two of the seam allowance dots meet the dots beneath on piece e. Pin in place and then sew along the marked diagonal lines. Using a quilting ruler, trim off excess fabric $1 / 4 \mathrm{in}$ ( 6 mm ) away from the sewn lines, as in Fig H 3. Press the triangles outwards and check their edges are aligned with the larger fabric piece. Check the unit's size - it should be 6 in $\times 3^{1 / 2} 2 \mathrm{in}(15.2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 9 \mathrm{~cm})$ at this stage (Fig H 4). All of the flowerpot units are made using this technique, changing fabrics as needed.

15 To sew the flowerpot unit together follow Fig I, pressing seams outwards for the first stage and then upwards towards the unpieced rectangle for the second stage.

16 When all of the units for a block have been made, the block can be assembled, as follows. Block 1 is shown in Fig J, but the other two blocks are assembled in the same way. Sew the flower unit to the leaf unit and then add the flowerpot at the bottom. Press seams open or to one side. Check the block is $61 / 2$ in $(16.5 \mathrm{~cm})$ wide $\times 133 / 4$ in $(35 \mathrm{~cm})$ tall.

17 Repeat this block-making process to make the other two blocks, changing fabrics as needed.

## Assembling the Pillow

18 Sew the side border strips and sashing to the blocks as in Fig K. Press seams towards the border/sashing pieces. Now add the longer top and bottom border strips and press seams outwards.

## Quilting and Finishing

19 Make a quilt sandwich of the patchwork, wadding (batting) and lining fabric (if using). Quilt as desired. Trim off excess wadding and lining fabric to match the patchwork size.

20 To make up the pillow cover, take the two pieces of fabric for the cushion back and on one long edge of each piece, create a hem by turning the edge over by 1 in ( 2.5 cm ), twice. Sew the seams with matching thread and press (Fig L). The diagram is shown in greys, so you can use the Tilda fabric and buttons suggested in the Materials list, or those of your choice.

21 For the fastening, using your sewing machine, create five equally spaced buttonholes within the hem of one of the pieces. Sew five buttons onto the other piece, matching their positions to the buttonholes. Note: Instead of making buttonholes, you could use a hook and loop fastening, such as Velcro, to fasten the cover and sew on the buttons as a decorative feature.

22 The pillow has a bound edge, so the pieces are assembled with right sides out, as follows. On the backing, fasten the buttons into the buttonholes and place the whole piece right side down. Place the quilted patchwork on top, right side up. Make sure the outer edges of all pieces are aligned. Pin or tack (baste) the layers together and then bind as normal. As you sew the binding in place it will fix the other layers together. Press the cover and insert a pillow pad to finish.
